What to do if a child is found not breathing

Emergency Response 1





Initial response if a child is found not breathing

- Stay Calm
- Alert other staff members
- Phone "000" immediately
- Commence resuscitation until the ambulance arrives
- Remove other children from area

Staff calling the ambulance are advised to state

- Resuscitation of the infant/child in progress
- Name of the infant/child and parents
- Medical history known about the infant/child
- Name, Address and Telephone number of the centre.



When the First Responders and parents arrive

- A staff member should meet the ambulance officers at the front of the centre and guide them to the infant/child.
- Police will also attend the center and should be met by staff.
- Allocate a staff member to meet and support the parent/primary carer upon arrival.



Telephone the parents as soon as you are able

- Ask them if they are okay to speak with you as you have some urgent information about their child.
- Advise them their child has stopped breathing, an ambulance has been called and resuscitation is underway.
- Recommend that the parents have someone else drive and/or accompany them to the centre.
- If the infant/child is transported to the hospital before the parents arrive, instruct them to go straight to the hospital.



Other considerations

- Remove other children from the room and keep them safe and calm.
- It is appropriate in an emergency to operate with minimum staff to children ratios in order to allow other staff to provide extra assistance if required.
- If the parents arrive at the service before the Police, then a staff member or ambulance officer must always remain in the presence of the child and parents.
- For legal reasons parents must not be left alone with the child until the Police are present.

To protect evidence, do not disturb the area

Police will attend the centre as part of standard procedure:

They will need to speak to the staff assigned to the room:

 This is to give information to the Coroner and is necessary for all sudden and unexpected deaths regardless of age.

They will organise for the child to be taken from the Centre:

 Parents can discuss with Police their preferences; however, the Coroner's Office usually has to approve these requests. 2

Once the child/family leave the centre:

Notify the parents of the other children present in the centre that there has been an unexpected incident in the centre:

 The most senior staff member, (or committee member/ management representative) should make the calls.

Give no personal details in relation to the family

 Encourage families to collect their child as soon as possible.

Ensure educators, other staff, children and families are provided with the opportunity to debrief, receive counselling, adequate information and strategies to work through their grief.

As soon as possible gather staff for a debriefing session:

- Advise staff of the Red Nose 24-hour bereavement support line 1300 308 307.
- Information and referrals can be made at Red Nose

- Advise educators and other staff that they should not individually speak to the media about the incident.
- Provide multiple opportunities for debriefing about the incident.
